Forty-five years ago, DFRC took an enormous step that forged the path to the incredible level of ABILITY, equality, acceptance and inclusion we celebrate today. The DFRC Blue-Gold Hand-in-Hand Program, initiated in 1974, has led thousands of people to a profound understanding about the ABILITIES of each life, guided our mission, and laid the foundation for the very heart of everything we do. The Hand-in-Hand Program is the element of the Blue-Gold experience that matches high school participants with buddies who are intellectually challenged to provide opportunities to get to know each other and nurture relationships that sometimes last far beyond the final moments of the big game.

As DFRC grew from 1956 and those early years, visionaries in the DFRC family believed there were many lessons to be learned to keep the mission of DFRC thriving. Committee members believed there was great value in giving participants an opportunity to spend time with people with intellectual disABILITIES and, by matching them with specific people, the experience would have added depth. From that belief, the Hand-in-Hand

Program was born and from a picture of the now legendary player and buddy logo came the program's name, Hand-in-Hand.




Two pioneers of the Hand-in-Hand Program devoted their entire lives to people who are intellectually challenged. The life careers of Barbara and the late

Winnie Spence were devoted to teaching children with disABILITIES and they were the very first Co-Chairpersons of DFRC's Hand-in-Hand Committee. To describe Barbara, we would talk about sweet, loving, compassionate, smart, wise, energetic, caring...the list goes on and on. For each of the 45 years of our Hand-in-Hand Program, Barbara has fostered impeccable matches, encouraged meaningful relationships,

and mastered the element of DFRC that IS the reason we do what we do. We are blessed beyond measure to have Barbara continuing to lead the way, not only for participants, buddies, and their families, but also for DFRC family members and thousands of others, as she lovingly guides and oversees the program that is the heart and soul of DFRC. 

When Melanie met her husband, Charlie immediately discovered how significant Matthew was to her life and how very special the journey from their Hand-in-Hand experience had been. Matthew was a groomsman and reader in Melanie and Charlie's wedding, honored to be included as their friend on this special day. Fourteen years since that first DFRC Hand-in-Hand experience, Melanie is proud of Matthew and all he means to her, Charlie, and their two children, to whom he is "Uncle Matt." Because Melanie and Matthew had the opportunity to learn about ABILITIES, share their interests, relate to each other, and most of all, become true friends, their journeys were impacted in tremendous ways. Friends for life, they will be!



Beginning his senior year in 2017 at St. Elizabeth High School, Casey Rock was full of excitement and promise. Ready to give his best to an outstanding football season, he trained hard and went into the first game with total commitment. During the third game of the season, Casey knew something wasn't right with his knee. He tried his best to stay in the game but soon succumbed to the torn ACL he tried to ignore. This injury changed quite a lot for Casey, but he kept his focus positive, determined to move forward.

Casey had aspired to have the opportunity to play in the DFRC Blue-Gold All-Star Game for many years, just as his uncles had done before him. With this injury, that possibility looked rather grim. Joe Papilli, President of St. Elizabeth School and DFRC Blue-Gold alumnus, called Tony Glenn, DFRC's Executive Director, telling him what an extraordinary person Casey was. There was no doubt Casey was the person of outstanding character we want to be a part of the DFRC family, and if he wasn't able to play, they decided a manager's position was a way we could keep him in

the program. When Casey received this news, he was full of gratitude for being "considered worthy" of such an honor. Casey was thrilled the first time he met his Hand-in-Hand buddy. Matthew's smile literally lit the room as he ran to Casey with a mighty bear hug, instantly melting Casey's heart. Casey and Matthew had awesome fun when they attended the DFRC events and at every opportunity they spent together. Casey felt good about their relationship and admired the way Matthew was always happy, never letting his disABILITY stop him from doing anything at all. Matthew helped Casey realize that football was great, but having his buddy was so much more than football. Casey opened his heart to everything he could learn.

While Casey was having such a great time in the Hand-in-Hand Program with Matthew, he was also healing from ACL surgery. Casey's life-long friend played in the 2017 Game and he was a source of encouragement for Casey to work hard. Casey also found inspiration in what he discovered from Matthew. If Matthew could overcome the daily obstacles he experienced, Casey was determined to give that same commitment to his own journey. Casey was working hard and feeling grateful that he had the opportunity to be a manager for the Blue team. Head Coach Dan Ritter recommended that they get a jersey for Casey and at least let him run down the sideline. As training camp approached, the news spread quickly that Casey had been cleared to play! Everyone was thrilled for him and proud of his dedication. Casey was never expected to heal in time to play in the Blue-Gold Game and he believes that the prayers and encouragement of his family and friends helped the process. On Game Day, when Matthew ran to meet Casey on the field just before kickoff, the trials of the year appeared and his heart was full of love and gratitude. From his Hand-in-Hand experience, Casey learned that life is not about what we can't do, but what we can do. It was all part of God's plan, for which Casey is extremely happy and grateful.
